

WE WANT YOU TO VOTE IF YOU WANT TO!

>>> VOTING IF YOU HAVE A FELONY CONVICTION

In Washington, if you are convicted of a felony¹ and you go to prison, your right to vote is revoked. Your right to vote is automatically restored when you are no longer under the authority² of the Department of Corrections. Once your right to vote is restored, you must re-register to vote - online, by mail or in person. If you were convicted of a felony in another state or federal court, your right to vote is restored as long as you are not currently incarcerated for that felony. This right can be revoked again by the Superior Court if you fail to repay financial obligations³ in a timely manner.
